## A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT...

At the General Meeting of the Onion Creek Meadows Property Owners Association on May 7 at the Manchaca Fire Rescue Station, the board re-elected Jim Cullen as president, Debra Tompkins as vice president, Temple Gossett as secretary and Jamie Beard as treasurer, and Christopher Mitchell was named to fill an open seat. One seat was not filled and remains open.

Travis County Pct. 3 Commissioner Gerald Daugherty spoke at the General Meeting and said work on the new bridge on Old San Antonio Road over Onion Creek will get started before the end of the year. The old bridge will remain open during the construction and will remain as an historic site after completion of the new bridge.

Travis County has asked the state Department of Transportation to put a traffic light on FM 1626 at Old San Antonio Road to handle the expected increase in traffic from the Estancia multi-use development, which will include retail and commercial uses as well as residential condos and apartments, and Bear Creek Crossing, where plans are to build 195 single-family houses. The county is asking for left-turn lanes on Twin Creeks and Old San Antonio roads and sidewalks on Twin Creeks Road.

The state Department of Transportation is proceeding with plans to expand FM 1626 into a five-lane road west of Manchaca Road, with completion of the project expected in 2019. Expansion of FM 1626 east of Manchaca Road is expected to come later.



Work has been going on in Estancia and has started in the Bear Creek Crossing housing development off Twin Creeks Road, where 112 lots are being developed in the first phase of the development.

We already can see an increase in traffic on Twin Creeks and Old San Antonio roads.

Voters on Nov. 7 will decide on bond proposals for county and school district projects affecting Onion Creek Meadows.

Travis County has called an election to seek voter approval for a \$184,940,000 bond issue with two propositions that focus on road safety and park projects. Proposition A includes \$93,445,000 worth of projects, including \$6,888,200 for bicycle lanes for Old San Antonio Road from FM 1626 to the Hays County line. County officials have said the total package would cost the average taxable homestead about \$24 a year.

Austin ISD will vote Nov. 7 on a \$1.05 billion bond proposal, which includes \$33.3 million for a new building to replace the current Menchaca Elementary School, which was built in 1975. School officials said the bond issue would not trigger a tax increase, because the new debt is replacing old debt that is being paid off.

In other news, Austin city officials and Travis County officials broke ground July 31 on a new station at the intersection of FM 1626 and Old San Antonio Road for the Austin Fire Department and Austin/Travis County Emergency Medical Services. When the new AFD station opens in 2018, it will house two fire vehicles and an ambulance with full-time crews.

The new Onion Creek fire station was authorized by a 2012 city bond election.

Currently, emergency medical technicians serving Onion Creek Meadows are based in the Manchaca Fire Rescue/Travis County Emergency Services District 5 during the day, with ambulances responding in off-hours from an Austin fire station on Ralph Ablanedo Drive.

Ambulances will be responding to Onion Creek Meadows 24/7 from the Onion Creek station on FM 1626 at Old San Antonio Road, with backups from Ralph Ablanedo Drive. Austin Fire Department crews also will be available for backups to the Manchaca Fire Department.

Manchaca Fire Rescue, formerly the Manchaca Volunteer Fire Department, now employs 12 fulltime firefighters, driver/operators and officers staffing the fire department 24 hours a day, seven days a



week, under the auspices of the Travis County Emergency Services District No. 5. The district also employs a part-time paid chief, and a part-time office administrator. (It still uses volunteers as firefighters, EMTs and support roles.)

Dispatches are coordinated on a 24-hour basis through the Austin Fire Department, and all personnel have radio communication/notification devices. Much of Travis County Emergency Services District No. 5's funding is derived from property tax receipts and a 2% sales tax on goods and services sold within the service district.

Onion Creek Meadows, and other neighborhoods that comprise the unincorporated community of Manchaca, got more control over our future this summer when the Texas Legislature approved Senate Bill 6, which requires cities in large counties to receive voter approval from areas that cities propose to annex before the cities can complete those annexations. Gov. Greg Abbott signed the bill Aug. 15.

The Onion Creek Meadows Property Owners Association is a voluntary organization, which represents our mutual interests. Our annual dues are \$20 (and memberships expire July 1).

Although membership in Onion Creek Meadows Property Owners Association is voluntary, every property owner in the Onion Creek Meadows subdivision is bound by deed restrictions that are on file with the Travis County Clerk's office of Real Property Records (see the text under "Deed Restrictions" at <u>ocmpoa.org</u>).

MOCHA: Manchaca Onion Creek Historical Association



"MOCHA" is a non-profit 501c (3) organization. MOCHA members adopted the goal of researching, preserving and sharing the rich history of southern Travis County and northeastern Hays County, as it borders Travis County.

In 2006 a group of like-minded individuals, many of whom lived in the Onion Creek subdivision, shared a keen interest in the area's history and organized to form the **Manchaca Onion Creek Historical Association (MOCHA)**. The founding members decided that their scope of interest included far south Travis County (Manchaca area) and northeastern Hays County. These areas enjoyed a common history. Many of the pioneering families of both counties were related through kinship or marriage, the educational needs of children were met by schools in both counties and lastly, early pioneers shared common water resources from



Onion Creek and Bear Creek waterways. Today, many current residents in these areas are descendants of the early pioneering families whose names are forever etched into the history of this area. In 2017, our mission still remains: *"Area residents racing against time to preserve local history."* 

From the inception of MOCHA, members remain dedicated to the sharing of information with our community. Our efforts have been fruitful. We have published books and calendars highlighting the history of this area. Teaming with Arcadia Publishing Co, in their **Images of America** series, we published **Images of Manchaca**. This publication contains a plethora of information about families, businesses, churches and other areas of interest. In addition, we have published **Memories of Manchaca** and **Historic Manchaca**, **Texas**, Each compiled and written by descendants of early pioneer families.

Most importantly, MOCHA members have visited with long-time residents and produced video /audio recordings of their early recollections. These interviews contain something more precious than gold - *memories*. MOCHA remains privileged to have shared their memories and to have produced a permanent record for all of us.

Our most recent activity has been to provide *individual markers* for important historical areas such as the African American School House and Church location on FM 1626, (now the site of a BBQ business) Another marker has been placed at the location of The Old Rock Church, which was owned and operated by the Cumberland Presbyterian Congregation and became the community gathering spot. It is located on Twin Creek Rd. near the Live Oak Cemetery. (Currently, it is the site of the Cidery, whose owners are allowing MOCHA to display some of the original Manchaca Post Office boxes) The owners are new to the area and enjoy unique, historical perspective of their business location. Other important locations will be designated as well with permanent historical markers, such as the original post office, site of the Mexican American School and others.

With the passing of many founding members and the health issues of others, MOCHA meetings are now held quarterly. Members continue to spend countless hours researching old records, maps and personal journals in order to glean the most accurate historical portrayal of our area. Go to our website site for a discussion of the origin and spelling of Manchaca.
